A Remarkable Christian Gentleman Mike Hixson

One of the most remarkable men who lived in the 20th century was A. M. Burton. He was born in Trousdale County, TN, on a farm in a small town called Hartsville, just under fifty miles northeast of Nashville. He had little formal education and worked in tobacco fields as a boy for a couple of quarters per day.

As a young man he got a job selling insurance and when the company went out of business, Burton along with five other people founded the Life and Casualty Insurance Company in Nashville in 1903. The insurance company made A. M. Burton a wealthy man and he used his wealth for the good of mankind and the glory of God (Matt. 5:16). It has been reported that he contributed to 1,000 congregations around the world. He was instrumental in the establishment of the Central congregation in Nashville and was one of the greatest benefactors in the history of David Lipscomb College.

To say that Brother Burton was a visionary would be a gross understatement. He had incredible vision and his vision was reflected in the financial support directed to the work of Brother Marshall Keeble. Brother Burton began supporting the preaching endeavors of Marshall Keeble in the 1920's, and that support continued until his death in 1968. The good Brother Marshall Keeble did in this world may never be realized this side of eternity. It has been reported that Brother Keeble baptized 30,000 people and established 350 congregations.

The work and benevolent spirit of Brother Burton live on. He touched countless lives and made this world a better place. A paraphrase of what was said about Winston Churchill was employed to describe Brother A. M. Burton following his death, "The oldest among us has never seen his equal and the youngest among us will never live to see such a man again."

It has been over fifty years since the death of this good man, yet "he being dead still speaks" (Heb. 11:4). Like Brother Burton, our goal ought to be to do as much good as we can, wherever we can, and as long as we can.
